



ABOUT THE REGION



Snohomish County is urban and rural, manufacturing and research, maritime and alpine. We are aerospace and much, much more. Our strong manufacturing base provides the stability for businesses in all sectors to grow and thrive. We are a collaborative community where the private and public sectors work together towards economic vitality for the region. An expanding inventory of housing options enables employees to live near where they work.

Our State's two research institutions, University of Washington and Washington State University, have a presence here; Excellent K-12 schools support early education. Two community colleges, that are often referred to as the most effective in the state, support business and education needs at several levels. 4-year universities and several private education institutions are expanding their presence, with a focus toward STEM education. An outstanding library system provides online and hands-on access to critical information.

Freight moves into-and-out-of the county through a network of roads, rail, deep-draft seaports and an international airport. International travelers are equidistant from Tokyo and London. Quick access to Seattle's major metropolitan area, and more secluded regions in which to enjoy the outdoors, put Snohomish County at the middle of it all.

QUALITY OF PLACE



Snohomish (sno-HOH'-mish) County is located in northwest Washington State, twelve miles north of Seattle and 100 miles south of Vancouver, Canada. We are located between the sparkling waters of Puget Sound, (a saltwater estuary used for both recreation and commerce) and the snow-capped peaks of the Cascade Mountains. Your business can be located in a downtown urban setting, a suburban business park or in the open spaces of the countryside. We can meet the demand for urban, suburban or rural lifestyles. Everett, the county seat and largest city, has a population of 103,000. Stanwood, a small community with an agricultural history, has a population of 5,000.

Our quality of place is heavily influenced by spectacularly beautiful, natural scenery. We are a recreational mecca with a temperate climate that encourages

year-round outdoor fun. For those with an inclination to water sports, we offer rivers for kayaking and rafting, lakes for boating and skiing, and inland waterways for scuba-diving or power/sailboat cruising. The Cascade and Olympic Mountain ranges offer peaks to climb in the summer and ski in the winter. If you are looking for a weekend getaway, a three hour drive to the east side of the state takes you to a desert-like climate with fruit orchards, grape vineyards (and wineries) and fields of wheat.

These natural amenities are supplemented and enhanced by the urban offerings of a major metropolitan area. While the county population is 740,000, the population of the Greater Seattle region is 2,700,000. World-class theater, museums catering to many interests, music, arts, shopping and dining can be easily found. A need for sports is met by the Seahawks (NFL), Mariners (MLB), Storm (WNBA), Sounders (MLS), Everett Aquasox (MiLB), Everett Silvertips (WHL) and the University of Washington, Huskies. Recreation includes our connection to aerospace. The Museum of Flight presents the history of aircraft; the Future of Flight makes you think about where we are headed. The latter is also your jumping-off point for a tour of the Boeing Commercial Airplane assembly plant,



the largest building in the world and the regions' most frequented tourist destination. Visit the Flying Heritage Collection or Historic Flight to see fully-restored and functional World War II aircraft found nowhere else. We are an international community. The regions' high-tech employers have attracted a workforce from counties around the world. Air carriers serving Seattle-Tacoma International Airport can take you non-stop to major cities in Europe and Asia.

Community Overview

Mill Creek is truly a unique and beautiful city. The friendly small-town charm of the original golf course community continues today with the additional amenities provided by the new Town Center and the other public and commercial areas in the city. The current population of 18,450 live in a variety of neighborhoods ranging from the traditional single-family homes, to the smaller cottage housing, and many high-quality townhomes and apartments. Parks and trails have always been a hallmark of the City, with over 23 miles of nature trails including the scenic North Creek Trail that runs along the North Creek Greenway (just west of the Town Center) from McCollum Park to the southern city limits. In addition, there are nine attractive neighborhood parks providing recreational opportunities for the residents, including the Sports Park, which features a lighted, artificial turf ball field for both Little League and youth soccer and a skate park. The Town Center has created a vibrant gathering place for the community with plazas just right for relaxing and enjoying some quality time while watching the pedestrians stroll past, on the wide sidewalks that line Main Street. There are many fine retail shops and restaurants available to choose from as well.

SNOHOMISH COUNTY'S LARGEST EMPLOYERS

Snohomish County is home to over 20,000 businesses, ranging from small family farms specializing in organic foods, to the world's largest advanced manufacturing facility producing state-of art aerospace equipment. WORKFORCE

Snohomish County is a blend of urban and suburban, white and blue collar.

Northern Snohomish County is the manufacturing center of Washington State. Twenty-five percent of our workforce is associated with manufacturing; twice the State average. The assembly of commercial aircraft is significant in our local economy, including both The Boeing Company and the associated supply chain. This supply chain, representing both products and services, is not limited to The Boeing Company. Many are doing business with Airbus while looking for opportunities with the growing list of single-aisle airframe manufacturers. Additionally, these suppliers have diversified to serve multiple markets including shipbuilding, defense, energy generation, etc.

Southern Snohomish County, with its proximity to Seattle, has a concentration of knowledgeable workers and life science companies. T-Mobile has an engineering technology center with a staff of 600 and Google is planning to open a facility in Bothell that is designed to house 800 workers. On the life science side, we have a cluster of medical device companies with a specific focus in ultrasound diagnostics. Philips Healthcare and Sonosite have a combined workforce of 3000. On the pharmaceutical side and smaller in scale, CMC Biologics has 200 scientists researching and producing pharmaceuticals on a contract basis.

There is a noteworthy migration of workers between King County (Seattle) and Snohomish County on a daily basis.
